Attention: Seniors

Now is the time to fill out all necessary financial aid forms for college! The due date for the 2008-2009 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and the Cal Grant G.P.A. Verification Form is **March 2nd.**

<u>Cal Grant GPA Verification:</u> Seniors can find Cal Grant GPA Verification release forms in the counseling office. Parents and students must sign the form giving Bishop Alemany High School permission to release GPA for verification to the California Commission.

FAFSA: The FAFSA can be filled out online at <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u> and worksheets are available in the counseling office. Paper applications can be requested from the website. Since most people are using estimated tax information, people are encouraged to fill out the FAFSA online where changes are easier and faster to make.

<u>CSS Profile:</u> Some private schools (i.e. Loyola Marymount University and USC) ask for the CSS profile as part of the financial aid application process. Students should check to see if this deadline is earlier than March 2nd. The CSS profile can be filled out online at www.collegeboard.com



"NEW "EXPECTED SCHOOL WIDE LEARNING RESULTS (ESLRs)

THE GRADUATE OF BISHOP ALEMANY HIGH SCHOOL WILL BE:

I. ENRICHED BY FAITH, THROUGH

A. Instruction in Catholic Doctrine and Practice

1.Each student will take a Religion course each semester and pass it with a grade of D or higher, demonstrating a basic knowledge of Catholic Doctrine and Religious practice.

2.The student will know the parts of the Mass and the proper responses from ASB and individual Religion class masses.

B. Experiences of Worship

1. The student will attend all ASB and class liturgies and participate by saying the responses and joining in the singing of praise.

2. The student will attend and participate in Advent and Lenten reconciliation services

3. The Students respectfully participate in daily prayers.

1.Students will practice the Golden Rule and demonstrate love and support for one another.

2. The student will show proper respect for adults on campus.

3.Each student will make good ethical and moral decisions based on Christian values.
